## Violence and Harassment in the Education Sector Survey conducted by the University of Ottawa

CUPE Saskatchewan, the CUPE Education Workers' Steering Committee, and the Saskatchewan Teachers' Federation are partnering to encourage workers in the education sector to participate in a survey on violence and harassment in the education sector.

The survey is part of a Canada wide research project being conducted by the University of Ottawa. This will be the largest study of its kind ever conducted in Canada and one of the few studies to examine the effect of the pandemic on rates and impacts of violence and harassment.

Dr. Darcy A. Santor is a practicing clinical psychologist and professor of psychology at the University of Ottawa.
